

- Move towards consumer-driven system




2001-2002 Priorities

- Pharmaceutical management
- Human subjects protection (VA, possibly private sector)

Privacy, Confidentiality

NCQA's HMO and PPO standards currently require:

- Confidentiality policies and procedures reviewed by designated internal committee
- Contracts with providers state expectations about confidentiality of member information and records
- Policies distinguish between routine and special consents



Privacy, Confidentiality cont.

- Member-identifiable information shared with employers only with specific consent from members
- Policies shared with prospective members
- Policies on access to medical records and member medical information shared with members and providers



Relationship to HIPAA

- NCQA is committed to facilitating the efficient exchange of electronic data to improve health and protect privacy
- NCQA will need to be HIPAA compliant
- Standards for all types of health care organizations will need to be consistent with HIPAA
- NCQA is interested in looking at HIPAA compliance in conjunction with other NCQA reviews



Relationship to HIPAA

HIPAA processes for which NCQA Standards can provide guidance:

- Consent processes
- Authorization processes
- Business associate processes
- Individual rights
- Internal protections



Relationship to HIPAA

- Role of state legislation?
- Is there a need to go beyond HIPAA?



Related concerns

Beyond areas strictly covered by HIPAA, the proliferation of electronic health information raises concerns

- Disease Management scientific basis;
 qualifications of staff; issues related to advertising;
 sponsorships; patient safety; uses of data
- Electronic Medial Information scientific basis;
 issues related to advertising; sponsorships; patient safety; uses of data
- PBMS scientific basis; patient safety; uses of data



Related concerns cont.

Health Internet Sites - scientific basis;
 qualifications of staff; issues related to advertising;
 sponsorships; uses of data



2000-2001-2002

- NCQA plans to develop a suite of evaluation products to address
 - privacy, confidentiality
 - scientific basis for content
 - treatment of advertising, sponsorships
 - patient safety
 - appropriate uses of data



2000-2001-2002 cont.

- These standards will be applied to a variety of health care settings
- Consistency with HIPAA will be part of this strategy
