



700,000 Scanned Documents! (5 FTEs @ \$11.34/hr)




## THE OVERFLOWING IN-BOX

### • If:

Easily access all results with just a "click" within a single sign-on clinical environment

### • Then:

- No need to scan/save/store data for *possible* future view
- In-box fills only with what is ordered, requested, or cc
- Dramatic decrease in unwanted in-box items
- Tremendous reduction in redundant data storage costs
