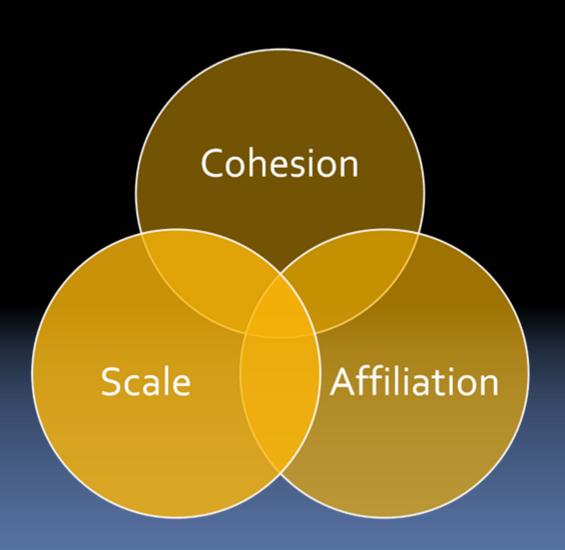

# The Literature on Engagement

#### Structural aspects of success

- Payment reform paying enough to incent the desired service
- Cohesion Degree to which physicians practice collaboratively (Tollen)
- Scale Minimum practice size to support necessary infrastructure (Tollen)
- Affiliation Part of a system to supply infrastructure support (Tollen)
- Adequate IT infrastructure

# Organizational Aspects

- Shared vision, values, mission
- Clarity of purpose of projects
- Translating clarity into defined expectations of physicians
- Providing accurate, valid data
- Capacity to provide feedback the practitioner can use directly to improve
- Strong physician leadership

# Organizational Aspects

- Respectful environment to share physician specific data
- Requires <u>appropriate</u> accountability
- Encourages and promotes empowered teams
- Provides training to support redesigned responsibilities
- Demonstrated track record in improvement

#### Interpersonal Aspects

- Identifying a dedicated, passionate champion
- Leadership believes in teams, encourages team based solutions
- Leaders effectively delegate authority
- Respect for team members and group process
- Effectively mentoring new learners and staff
- Impatient patience

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
